

SKIMMING Off The Top

Transnational organized crime groups are targeting multiple government benefits programs here in the United States and in 2024 stole nearly \$18 billion dollars. To combat these crimes, the Secret Service is actively conducting arrests and proactive enforcement operations across the country. Over the course of the past year, the Secret Service collaborated with public and private sector partners to visit 4,000 businesses to conduct around 30,000 inspections to remove illegal skimming devices that could be used to steal benefit program recipients' funds. Proactive efforts resulted in over 150 illegal skimming devices being removed and saving an estimated \$45 million dollars in fraud loss to the US Government. While conducting operations, the USSS also arrested nearly 40 individuals facilitating illegal cashouts to steal victim funds.

Preventing Domestic Violence and Mass Violence

In April 2025, the U.S. Secret Service National Threat Assessment Center (NTAC) released a behavioral case study highlighting the connection between domestic violence and mass violence. First Baptist Church of Sutherland Springs: A Case Study on the Link Between Domestic Violence and Mass Attacks provides a detailed look at the background and behavioral history of the individual who perpetrated the worst mass shooting in Texas state history. The gunman, who had a long history of severe domestic violence perpetrated against his two wives and numerous other women, killed 26 people, including his wife's grandmother, and wounded an additional 22 others. In conjunction with the publication release, NTAC hosted a virtual training event that registered 8,147 participants from all 50 states and 65 countries. Registrants represented a variety of sectors, including federal government (e.g., DoD, DHS, FBI), state and local law enforcement (e.g., Amarillo Police Department, Houston County Sheriff's Office, Michigan State Police), and corporate security (e.g., NFL, American Airlines, FedEx).

A Nose for Technology:

Strategic Investment in Public Safety: The National Computer Forensics Institute (NCFI), Electronic Detection Dog (EDD) Course

The Secret Service's National Computer Forensics Institute continues to innovate utilizing the amazing abilities of our trusted K9 partners. The new Electronic Detection Dog Course, a groundbreaking program developed at NCFI, pairs law enforcement officers with highly trained dogs and certifies them as Electronic Storage Detection (ESD) dog handlers while also training them in digital evidence collection and courtroom testimony. The course is structured to fulfill NCFI's broader mission of supporting state, local, tribal, and territorial law enforcement with specialized education, technology, and equipment necessary to investigate and prevent cybercrime.

These incredible K9 partners, primarily Labrador Retrievers, have the ability to detect the scent of chemicals used on circuit boards in storage media, even under running water. This ability has been critical in locating devices deliberately hidden to evade detection. The program serves as a force multiplier in criminal investigations and is already strengthening operations across the U.S. Secret Service's Cyber Fraud Task Forces. As cybercrime continues to grow in frequency and sophistication, the EDD Course exemplifies the kind of proactive, integrated solution required to meet modern law enforcement demands.









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
